Holy Communion for the sick and housebound:

Communion for the Sick or Housebound.

If you would like to have Holy Communion brought to a family member or friend who may be sick or housebound, please contact one of the priests or the Parish Office.

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Holy Communion can only be brought by a priest or a commissioned minister of the Eucharist and a Pyx, which has been blessed, is the only means by which the Sacred Host can be carried.

Out of respect for the Sacred Host, Holy Communion should never be taken home in a piece of tissue or an envelope.

CATECHETICAL CORNER - "I'M RAGING..."


The days are getting shorter and shorter, the nights are longer and darker. In this part of the world and at this time of the year it can almost feel like the world is closing in on us. And yet all it takes to lift the dark on the darkest of nights is a single light or candle. It doesn't even have to be that strong.

In Advent we, to quote Dylan Thomas, "...rage against the dying of the light." We start our raging by lighting a single candle on the Advent Wreath. Our first candle is associated with Hope.

As we begin the Churches' new year it is appropriate that the first candle is that of Hope, especially this year, for Pope Francis has declared this a Jubilee Year on the theme of Hope. And as our world darkens both physically and metaphorically we need Hope.

So what is a Jubilee? A Jubilee is intended to call us back into a closer relationship with GOD. Quoting the prophet Isaiah, the Gospel of Luke describes Jesus' mission in this way: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord," (Luke 4:18-19; cf. Isaiah 61:1-2).

The characteristics of the Jubilee are, where possible: 1. Making pilgrimage: The pilgrimage can be physical, actually going somewhere; but pilgrimage is characterised by prayer and conversion so it can happen at home. 2. Visiting the Holy Door: The Jubilee Year is officially launched when the Pope opens the Holy Door in the Basilica of St John Lateran. 3. Reconciliation: being reconciled with GOD, with others and with ourselves. 4. Prayer: There are many reasons and ways to pray, but at the root of prayer is always the desire to be open to God's presence and His offer of love. It is the Spirit of the Son that calls the Christian community to prayer and allows for each person to return to the Father. 5. Liturgy: Participating more often and more fully in the Liturgical life of the Church. This require some effort on our part to learn more about the Liturgical and Sacramental life of the Church. 6. Profession of Faith: "To say the Creed with faith is to enter into communion with God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and also with the whole Church which transmits the faith to us and in whose midst, we believe" (CCC 197). 7. Indulgence: There is an indulgence associated with the Jubilee. The Jubilee Indulgence is a concrete manifestation of God's mercy... To gain the indulgence we should, if our means and health allow, fulfil the characteristics of the Jubilee. Advent is a season of Hope on the cusp of a year dedicated to Hope. The Jubilee along with Advent calls us to Rage against the darkness with light and against despair with hope. I'm raging, are you?





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
