CATECHETICAL CORNER - A HALLMARK CHRISTMAS

It is that time of year again. As we come to the final days of Advent, and Christmas is almost upon us, for many of us there is a tremendous pressure, either from ourselves, our families or just from society, the culture in which we live, to have, what has been called, a 'Hallmark Christmas'. A Hallmark Christmas is the kind of Christmas that we see in those Christmas movies on the Hallmark Channel or the Christmas Channel that none of us will admit to watching, where there is never a cross word, nobody is stressed, the cooking all turns out perfect, everybody gets the exact perfect gift, beautifully wrapped of course, where love, peace and harmony reign supreme and all our dreams come true. Oh, wouldn't that be lovely?

The reality, however, is often far removed from this, idyllic Hallmark scene. That is why it might be worthwhile taking some time to consider just what it's all about, and just what the point of it all is. Yes, we are celebrating the birth of Jesus, but we are also celebrating family and being together. To make it as pleasant as possible here is some good advice from St Paul via Sharon Jaynes:

If I decorate my house perfectly with plaid bows, strands of twinkling lights and shiny balls, but do not show love to my family, I'm just another decorator.

If I slave away in the kitchen, baking dozens of [mince pies], preparing gourmet meals and arranging a beautifully adorned table at mealtime, but do not show love to my family, I'm just another cook.

If I work at the soup kitchen, carol in the nursing home and give all that I have to charity, but do not show love to my family, it profits me nothing.

If I trim the spruce with shimmering angels and crocheted snowflakes, attend a myriad of [Christmas] parties and sing in the choir's cantata but do not focus on Christ, I have missed the point.

Love stops the cooking to hug the child. Love sets aside the decorating to kiss the husband. Love is kind, though harried and tired. Love doesn't envy another's home that has coordinated Christmas china and table linens.

Love doesn't yell at the kids to get out of the way, but is thankful they are there to be in the way. Love doesn't give only to those who are able to give in return but rejoices in giving to those who can't.

Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails. Video games will break, pearl necklaces will be lost, golf clubs will rust, but giving the gift of love will endure.
