#### "Brothers and sisters, this is the Jubilee Year." Pope Francis January 2025 - 'Jubilee of Hope' 2025

What is a holy year? We celebrate a Holy Year every 25 years. Those who participate in a Holy Year pilgrimage are granted a plenary indulgence; those who are unable to attend are invited to participate spiritually, "offering up the sufferings of their daily lives, and participating in the Eucharistic celebration."

**How often does it happen?** Every 25 years, unless a Pope calls an extraordinary one to call attention to a particular issue or celebrate a momentous event. The last ordinary Holy Year was held in 2000 under Pope John Paul II. The last extraordinary Holy Year was called by Francis in 2016 to emphasise his desire to present the Church as merciful and welcoming rather than moralizing and remote. The start of the year is marked by the opening of the "Holy Door."

What's the significance of the Holy Door? The Holy Door is an actual door which remains closed from one Holy Year to the next. It's deemed 'Holy' since it calls all those who enter through it to walk in holiness in their life. In the footsteps of the Pope, representatives of the People of God crossed its threshold, as a prelude to the countless pilgrims of hope from every country and language who will visit St. Peter's Basilica and celebrate the mysteries of salvation during the Holy Year.

When did this tradition start? The custom goes back to Pope Martin V who, for the Extraordinary Jubilee of 1423, opened a Holy Door to enter the Lateran Basilica. In St. Peter's Basilica it was first used for the Jubilee of 1450. This tradition remained virtually unchanged over the centuries. The last opening of the Holy Door for an Ordinary Jubilee was when Pope St. John Paul II opened it in 2000. Then out of sequence Pope Francis opened the Holy Door in 2015 calling for an Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy.

Why have a Jubilee Year? A Jubilee year is to strengthen faith and recognize Christ in our midst. Pope Francis prayed, "may the light of Christian hope illumine every man and woman, as a message of God's love addressed to all! And may the Church bear faithful witness to this message in every part of the world!" The Holy Father invites us to pray, so that this Jubilee may "strengthen us in our faith, helping us to recognize the Risen Christ in the midst of our lives, transforming us into pilgrims of Christian hope."

What the Holy Father says about the Holy Year. The Holy Father reflects on how "God, has become one of us to make us like Himself; He has come down to us to lift us up and restore us to the embrace of the Father." "The infinitely great, made Himself tiny" he said and "the glory of heaven appeared on earth as a little child." He continued, "If God can visit us, even when our hearts seem like a lowly manger, we can truly say: Hope is not dead; hope is alive, and it embraces our lives forever!" 'There is hope for you' When he was opening the "Holy Door" Pope Francis said, "Tonight, the door of hope has opened wide to the world God speaks to each of us and says: there is hope also for you!" Pope Francis underscored, the Jubilee "is a summons not to be tarry, to be kept back by our old habits, or to wallow in mediocrity or laziness." He recalled Saint Augustine's having suggested, "that hope calls us to be upset with things that are wrong and to find the courage to change them". With this in mind, as disciples of the Lord, the Holy Father encouraged, "we are called to find our greater hope in Him, and then, without delay, carry that hope with us, as pilgrims of light amid the darkness of this world." "Brothers and sisters," the Pope reminded, "this is the Jubilee." "This is the season of hope in which we are invited to rediscover the joy of meeting the Lord," he "calls us to spiritual renewal and commits us to the transformation of our world, so that this year may truly become a time of jubilation. "Pope Francis concluded by saying, "Dear sister, dear brother, on this night the 'holy door' of God's heart lies open before you. Jesus, God-with-us, is born for you, for us, for every man and woman. With him, joy flourishes; with Him, life changes; with Him, hope does not disappoint."

#### The Jubilee Prayer

Father in heaven, may the faith you have given us in your son, Jesus Christ, our brother, and the flame of charity enkindled in our hearts by the Holy Spirit, reawaken in us the blessed hope for the coming of your Kingdom.

May your grace transform us into tireless cultivators of the seeds of the Gospel. May those seeds transform from within both humanity and the whole cosmos in the sure expectation of a new heaven and a new earth, when, with the powers of Evil vanquished, your glory will shine eternally.

May the grace of the Jubilee reawaken in us, *Pilgrims of Hope*, a yearning for the treasures of heaven. May that same grace spread the joy and peace of our Redeemer throughout the earth. To you our God, eternally blessed, be glory and praise for ever. Amen

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
