CATECHETICAL CORNER - "GUILTY OR NOT GUILTY?"

Imagine you were to put you on trial for being Catholic. Would there be enough evidence to convict you? What evidence do you think might be presented?

Perhaps that you attended Mass weekly – if you do. If not weekly, that you attended Mass from time to time, when it suited your life style. They might say that you have be known to pray, especially when you needed something or someone in your family was sick or in trouble. They might even say you contributed to the annual collection for the society of St Vincent De Paul. What else might they say? If you were facing conviction based on this evidence, what would you say in your defence? Perhaps you might say something like; "Ah yes, but I only did those things out of habit. I was brought up as a Catholic and my parents made me this way." Is the evidence that was presented enough to convict you of being a Catholic? Is that what Catholicism boils down to?

Fr Terence Henry, a Franciscan priest, said recently: "The age of casual Catholicism is over the age of heroic Catholicism has begun. We can no longer be Catholics by accident but instead we must become Catholics by conviction." What does it mean to be "Catholic by conviction"? If it not obvious to others around us that we are Catholic, then we are doing it wrong. If love for GOD, made visible in our love for other people, is not our guiding principle, then we are doing it wrong. If being Catholic is not hard, really hard, then we are doing it wrong. Why? Because to be Catholic by conviction, to be a heroic Catholic, goes against our human nature.

But here is the good news, we have a super-power that enables us to be 'Super-Catholic-Heroes'. It is called Grace! There is 'Sanctifying Grace' given to us in Baptism; "...the free and undeserved help that God gives us to respond to his call to become children of God, adoptive sons [and daughters], partakers of the divine nature and of eternal life...Grace is a participation in the life of God." (Catechism of the Catholic Church #1996-1997). There are also 'Actual Graces' which "refer to God's interventions, whether at the beginning of conversion or in the course of the work of sanctification" (CCC # 2000) This grace is offered and we either cooperate with or we don't, in which case it goes away. Then there are "...sacramental [actual] graces, gifts proper to the different sacraments." (CCC #2003). The more we avail of the sacraments the more we are disposed to receiving these graces. Catholics by conviction, heroic Catholics, shouldn't need to put on trial, it should be a foregone conclusion, we are guilty as charged!
